




On October 13, before a record audience, Urban League CEO Ruben Anthony was joined by board members and other key partners for a very special announcement. *In honor of our 2018 being our 50th anniversary year serving Greater Madison, we are launching a 1,500 Jobs, 1,500 families campaign to raise \$2,000,000 next year to support our efforts to place 1,500 people into jobs by 2020.* The campaign was kicked off by a \$410,000 commitment from Urban League board members and from 5 our largest and longest-standing supporters: Alliant Energy, American Family Insurance, CUNA Mutual Group, Exact Sciences, and Madison Gas & Electric. We have an exciting year planned to commemorate our history, and recommit ourselves to the next phase of our work.



Middle and high school youth were recognized at the annual **Martin Luther** King, Jr. Breakfast with Outstanding Young Person Awards in honor of their academic performance, school involvement, and community service. Another 4 students received \$750 Betty Franklin-Hammonds Scholarships. The Breakfast drew a record crowd of nearly 900 people.

The Urban League collaborated with the Madison Youth Employment Network to host the first annual *Summer Teen Job Fair* at our Park Street Workforce Training Center on March 31st. Over 109 teens attended the Job Fair on their day off school where they were able to visit with various youth employment training programs, and private sector employers such as the Madison Mallards, YMCA, Henry Vilas Zoo, and others.





We continued our unique collaboration with the Madison Region Economic Partnership (MadREP) and hosted our 5th joint Economic Development & Diversity Summit. Attendance hit a new record with nearly 600 attendees. Our distinguished lineup of speakers included Tiffany Jana, Dr. Alicia Robb, Dr. Chris Benner, Kathy George, Dr. Edward Hubbard, Himar Hernandez, Angela Russell, and more than 20 other brilliant breakout session presenters and panelists.

We piloted a new Medical Scheduler Academy in partnership with UW Health this spring. The program trained 18 job seekers for in-demand Medical Scheduler roles. As a result of this success, DWD Secretary *Ray Allen announced a grant at the Unity Picnic of \$93,387* to expand this class and our Healthcare Administration Academy to include all four of the region's largest healthcare providers: Group Health Cooperative, SSM Health, UnityPoint Health-Meriter, and UW Health. The collaborative will train and place at least 85 people over the next 18 months.



We held the *3rd annual Unity Picnic* here on the grounds of the Village on Park. It was a family friendly event with food, music, dance, kids activities, and more.













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Our construction workforce development programming was significantly bolstered this year after finalizing the acquisition of Construction Training, Inc. this February. We added to our programming the START Program which so far this year has helped 55 individuals prepare for and pass their apprenticeship qualifying exam; the Construction Workforce Diversity Alliance which engaged with more than 100 contractors, CBOs, public agencies, and apprenticeship programs, and others on activities like monthly apprenticeship info sessions at the Job Center and more; and the Construction Employment Initiative which is a collaboration of multiple community-based agencies working to train and place job seekers in the construction field. This is on top of our Foundations for the Trades Academy which trained and placed 23 job

seekers into jobs averaging \$16.10/hr. and our Commercial Driver's License partnership which Dane County and the Latino Academy for Workforce Development which trained and placed 4 people into Dane County Highway jobs paying \$22.95/hr.
